
Council Corner

Doing Our Part To Conserve Our Most Precious Resource

On March 17, 2021, Utah Governor Spencer Cox declared a state of emergency due to the state's drought conditions. Salt Lake County has committed to reducing its water use by at least 5%, and encouraged its residents to do the same. For months, the state Division of Water Resources has reported a winter snowpack well below normal levels as the majority of the state is in the "exceptional drought" designation. We want our residents to know that Herriman City is doing its part to help conserve water.

As a significant majority of water usage results from irrigation, Herriman City's Parks Department implemented a best management practice in early April to help reduce impact on water resources. A full list of those practices—many of them included in existing procedures—can be found at herriman.org/parks. In part, the department is reducing irrigation in recreation areas, replacing old controllers and equipment with updated, water-efficient equipment, and performing weekly operation checks on all the thousands of City sprinkler heads. If you happen to see a malfunctioning sprinkler, please contact the City at 801-446-5323, or go to herriman.org/report-an-issue. Additionally, with some coordination with the Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District, the City adopted in December new water efficiency standards for new construction and landscaping.

Though water levels are reduced this year, we want to ensure you we will not run out of drinking water. The Jordan Valley Water Conservancy District continually assures its members—of which Herriman City is one—that years of careful, conservative planning leave us in a good position, even with exceptional drought conditions. Additionally, Herriman City, the county, and the state all have measures in place to reduce water use as needed (depending on the severity of conditions) to ensure

Road Resurfacing



▲ Every year, Herriman City analyzes the integrity of its existing pavement. To maintain the longevity of the asphalt, surface treatment is required on lower grade roads. From May through June, these treatments will be applied in certain areas throughout the city.

▲ The contractors will notify impacted residents prior to treating neighborhood roads. This may require alternate routes and delays in travel time.

Sprinklertime is in the Air

With the arrival spring and the end of freezing temperatures, it is time to turn on irrigation systems and start watering again. Starting up the system is easier than you may think and many homeowners choose to do this themselves.

Take these few important steps to ensure you don't damage pipes or irrigation components:

- 1 **Open the system main water valve** slowly to allow pipes to fill with water gradually. If these valves are opened too quickly, sprinkler main lines are subjected to high surge pressures, uncontrolled flow and water hammer, which may cause them to crack or burst.
- 2 **Visually inspect your sprinkler control valves** and back-flow prevention device for leaks after turning water on. Be sure that stop and waste valves are fully opened or they may allow water to leak from valve.
- 3 **Manually activate each zone** to make sure each station valve works. This is the right time to look for any damage that may have occurred through the winter. Check each station and valve and adjust as needed.



- 4 **Check for proper operating pressure, rotation, and spray area.** Low pressure indicates a possible line break or missing sprinkler.
- 5 **Check and clean filters on poorly performing sprinklers.**
- 6 **Adjust heads as necessary.**



Go through a similar checklist several times on different occasions to catch any leaks you may have overlooked.

Memorial Day Cemetery Decorations



With Memorial Day approaching, the Parks department reminds residents of the rules and regulations at the Herriman Cemetery:

- Grave decorations are to be placed only in an existing receptacle or on the grave marker/headstone.
- No glass, porcelain, or other breakable decorations/containers are allowed.
- No decorations of any kind are allowed in the grass.
- No hanging devices are allowed in the grass (i.e. shepherds hooks, wired baskets, balloons, etc.).
- Any grave decorations, funeral designs, flowers, or other items are subject to removal for maintenance.*
- Funeral decorations are allowed for seven calendar days or until they become unsightly, after which they will be

removed and discarded.

- No plants, bushes, trees, shrubs, flowers, or other vegetation may be planted in the cemetery by anyone other than City personnel.
- No recreational or athletic activities are permitted within the cemetery.
- Alcoholic beverages and smoking are prohibited.

***Maintenance generally occurs each Tuesday except around all City-recognized holidays. For holidays, decorations will be removed a week after the holiday occurs.**

What Are the Rules for Trees?

Happy Arbor Day! Now is the time to plant your trees. Before you plant your tree, there are a few things you need to know about the city's rules and regulations. The City Code can be found at bit.ly/herrimantreescode.

City code authorizes the City to prune, remove, and replant street trees. However, it is still the responsibility of the homeowner to water and care for the trees in their park strip. Pruning needs to be done carefully (preferably by an ISA-certified arborist) to ensure the health of the tree is maintained and to prevent future problems with access to streets and sidewalks. Also, note that City code says topping trees is illegal!

There is a list of approved and prohibited street trees found at herriman.org/trees. This is important because different trees have different characteristics. Evergreens and conifers are prohibited in park strips due to limited visibility. Certain trees are prohibited in small park strips because their root systems get large and destroy sidewalks. Wider park strips allow for larger trees. Flowering pear



trees are now on the prohibited list primarily because they are too prevalent in the city and they have a habit of breaking large branches in occasional wind storms. Any questions relating to the street tree program can be directed to the City Arborist at 801-410-3653.

that drinking water is always available to residents. Simple water conservation by the general population delays or reduces the need for those measures to be implemented.

We invite our residents to join us in examining our daily habits and reducing our water use—things like taking shorter showers, irrigating less (and at night), sweeping instead of spraying the patio or garage, and more. Additionally, there are some rebates available from Utah Water Savers to help offset some costs for installing water-friendly landscaping. We hope that together, we can each go a little out of our way to collectively make a big difference in conserving our most precious resource.

If 1 in 4 Salt Lake County residents reduce their water use by just 5%, it would save 2 millions gallons per day—enough to fill 9 lap swimming pools!



technology advancements. For owner-builders doing renovations or finishing a basement, we educate and work to help you understand best practices to ensure your work complies with code.




