## Council Corner

### New SLCC/U of U College Campus Groundbreaking

Herriman City is excited to welcome Salt Lake Community College and the University of Utah to our community with the long-awaited groundbreaking of the Juniper Canyon Campus. It is a place where students can earn an associate degree through SLCC and a bachelor's degree from the U of U—all in the same location.

We have worked jointly with the state legislature to secure funding for the project, including \$32 million from the 2021 legislative session to help build the first structure—the 90,000-square-foot Juniper Building. The building is the first of several planned, and classes are set to begin in the 2023 fall semester. The campus will initially host over 2,000 students, and by 2025, will offer 12 programs to over 6,000 students between SLCC and the U of U. The programs were identified by the two colleges as high-demand areas in Utah and will be a natural transition for incoming students from the five high schools within five miles of the campus.

The journey started in 2011, with the City and SLCC joining together to bring this concept to fruition. The City has provided infrastructure support for the project with a water line, tank, pump station, and road improvements including Real Vista Parkway, Autumn Crest Boulevard, and Bruin View Drive. The master plan includes a trail through the campus that connects with the Juniper Canyon trail. The campus will bring vibrance to the nearby Academy Village commercial area and the Real Salt Lake Academy.

SLCC is committed to excellence in education and this campus has unlimited possibilities, offering an inviting learning environment in the new, innovate, state-of-the-art facility with views of our beautiful Juniper Canyon. This college campus will be a place of fond memories for students and the community alike. We look forward to the completion of this amazing addition to our community.

**CONCRETE/CEMENT**


At 95°, cement can heat up to as high as 125°.

Anglers young and old, with a fishing license, can cast a line in and catch a fish without even leaving the city. Additional park features include a sand volleyball court, a playground, and picnic pavilions.

**Tracking Green Waste To Reduce Costs**



All residents who have taken advantage of the green waste disposal at our spring and fall clean-ups the past year will be familiar with the fact that we are tracking time spent collecting this waste. The City is doing this through participation in the Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). This plan works by tracking any time spent to eliminate potential hazards for wildfires and submitting the results to the Unified Fire Authority. If a wildfire were to occur in the city, UFA can see that we have taken the initiative to do our part to mitigate these fires, they will reduce the large bill associated with putting out the fire. Our Spring clean-up in May brought in 182 hours of green waste collection to report. This is only resident-tracked time and does not include City staff time that was spent chipping and disposing of the waste.

**Rhyan White**

As reported in the Desert News, Herriman's Rhyan White punched her ticket to the Tokyo Olympics on Saturday, June 19, 2021. White clinched her spot on the United States' Olympic swimming team when she beat out the favorite, world record holder and reigning world champion Regan Smith in the 200-meter backstroke with a time of 2:05.73. White also qualified in the 100-meter backstroke with her second-place finish to Smith earlier in the week.

White grew up in Herriman, attended Cottonwood High School, is currently a junior, having an exceptional career, at the University of Alabama, and is now headed to the Olympics. In addition to qualifying for the Olympics, White has an array of accolades during her swimming career including All-American, SEC Swimmer of the Year,

SEC Commissioner's Trophy, First Team All-SEC, and SEC All-Freshman Team among others according to [rolltide.com](http://rolltide.com). She has also set many school records and earned the Crimson Tide's Most Valuable award.

Noted on [teamusa.org](http://teamusa.org), White is the first to qualify for both backstrokes at the Olympic Games since Missy Franklin in 2012. She is also the first Youth Olympic Games gold medalist (2018) to make the U.S. Olympic Team in swimming.

Rhyan, good luck in Tokyo and bring home the gold!

## DROUGHT RESPONSE ACTIONS

During drought, little changes make a BIG difference. Below are actions we can all do to save water:

### Action #1 - Water Less

It takes approximately 3,000 gallons of water each time you water the average quarter-acre yard. During the drought, you should be watering two times per week (grass is more resilient than you might think and can survive with only 1" of water a month!). It won't be green and will enter dormancy during times of drought and high temperatures, but recovery will happen when conditions improve.

### Action #2 - Don't Water if It's Windy

If the wind speed is above 5 mph, don't water because much of it will blow where it's not needed, evaporate, and be wasted.

### Action #3 - Water at the Right Time

Don't water between 10 AM & 6 PM to reduce evaporation loss. The exception to this rule is if it's windy nightly. In this case, pick a time that's less windy, even if it's during the day. While watering during the day seems counterproductive, it will still be more effective than watering during windy conditions.

### Action #4 - Prioritize Your Watering

Water vegetation in your yard in this order: 1) Trees 2) Shrubs 3) Perennials 4) Annuals 5) Grass

### Action #5 - Raise Your Mower

Set your blades at 3-4 inches. Taller grass means deeper roots that can access water that is deeper in the soil. Tall grass also shades roots and soil to reduce evaporation loss.

## FIRE SERVICE PROPERTY TAX UPDATE

By July 22, the Salt Lake County Auditor will mail a notice of property valuation and tax changes. On your notice, you'll see a change in Herriman City's property taxes—an increase to offset a 100% decrease in the Unified Fire Service Area. UFSA is a multi-city taxing entity that previously collected property taxes from Herriman residents to pay for fire services within the city.

Herriman City is forming its own fire service taxing entity, but the new entity will not show on your property taxes until next year. For this year, the City is temporarily increasing its portion of property taxes by the same rate that the UFSA charged previously. It is anticipated that the City's taxes will go back down to the previous amount next year when the new entity is formed.

**The total amount of property taxes Herriman residents pay will not change.**


