

Sprinkler Start Up & Cross Connections

With the approaching arrival spring and the freezing temperatures coming to an end, it is time to prepare for turning on irrigation systems and watering our lawns again. Starting up your irrigation system in the springtime is easier than you may think and many homeowners choose to do this for themselves.

It is very important to make sure that certain steps are followed when starting up your irrigation system, in order to make sure you do not damage water pipes or irrigation components.

•Open the system main water valve slowly to allow pipes to fill with water gradually. If using culinary water, this valve could be located inside your home in the area of where the waterline enters the exterior wall, or it could be a stop & waste valve connected to the main water supply line on the outside of your home. If these valves are opened too quickly, sprinkler main lines are subjected to high surge pressures, uncontrolled flow and water hammer, which may cause them to crack or burst.

•Visually inspect your sprinkler control valves and backflow prevention device for leaks after turning water on.

•Verify the proper operation of each station valve by manually activating all zones from the controller.

•Walk through each station on the controller checking for proper operation of the zone and proper sprinkler adjustment.

•Check for proper operating pressure (low pressure indicates a possible line break or missing sprinkler), proper rotation and adjustment of sprinkler heads, and adequate coverage not over spraying the asphalt or concrete surfaces etc.

•Check and clean filters on poorly performing sprinklers. Adjust heads as necessary.

Cross Connections:

To ensure safe, clean drinking water, your Cross Connection Control (backflow prevention system) must be tested by a certified backflow technician annually. City Ordinance 12-35-12-36, Federal Safe Drinking Act Amendments and the State of Utah Cross Connection Control Program all require the following:

-New assemblies must be tested within 10 days of initial use.

-All assemblies must be tested annually.

-A copy of the test results must be submitted to Herriman City offices.

-Water and service may be disconnected to customers found to be in violation.

Always make sure to check your sprinkling system for any leaks or damage when first starting your system in the spring.

Go through a similar checklist several times on different occasions to catch any leaks you may have overlooked. The warmer months lead to higher water use, but checking for leaks on a regular basis could help you avoid an even higher water bill.




New 18-Hole Disc Golf Course

Herriman City is now home to a new 18-hole disc golf course in the Rosecrest area. Though a few additional touches will be added over the next two months, this park will open for play the first of April. The course consists of Par 3 and Par 5 holes in a links-style course that runs around 2.1 miles. Course construction began in early Fall, but the idea has been in the works for a while. Over the last year, members of our Parks Department, GIS Department and several individuals from the Disc Golf community worked together on the layout and design of the course. This course is nestled between a residential area and open space and has a sign with a QR code at every hole that provides information on the course. Course rules will be posted soon. We are excited to offer this new amenity to our community.

Evacuation Plans for Livestock

Do you have an evacuation plan for your horse or livestock? Have you registered them with Salt Lake County Animal Services? Animal Services has a FREE and QUICK registration form for you to fill out. Not only does registering your livestock enable Animal Service Officers to locate and notify you of stray livestock without impounding and transporting those animals, they also will receive priority during emergency evacuations, such as fires or floods.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

Registrations are filed by location/address at Animal Services. When officers are notified of loose livestock they will compare the description given with those livestock registered in that area. When a match is discovered, the owner is called and notified.

WHY REGISTER LIVESTOCK?

Prompt "roundup" of stray livestock prevents injury to the animals or people, and damage to neighbors' property - all of which the owner is legally and financially responsible for. It also may eliminate or reduce charges by Animal Services for costs incurred during handling of animals.



Herriman City - Working Together

First, I'm advocating a regular citywide survey to ensure our service levels are meeting the needs and expectations of the residents, and with that input, improvements are made accordingly. It's simple, if we don't ask; we don't know how we're doing as a city.

Second, my hope is to expand the approval process of all future projects to include a required neighborhood meeting of the affected area. This process would be guided by volunteer Community Coordinators, with the hope that by getting information out to "ground zero" at the impetus of a project, we will combat misinformation and could very well improve the project with resident feedback.

In the absence of two-way dialogue between a city and its residents, misinformation flourishes, to the detriment of all. Rumors are inevitably all or partly wrong and can greatly damage the goodwill that is so important if we are to build a strong, healthy and vibrant community.

3 - Build a sense of community pride

This leads me to my final goal of developing a love of community. The book, "For the Love of Cities", by Peter Kageyama makes the bold statement that there can and should be a "love affair between people and their places" and that this connection can be one of the most powerful influences in our lives. I agree wholeheartedly with this concept and invite all of you to Google one of his many talks on this subject.

As we work together to build Herriman, let's rise above the standard of merely making our city livable and actually make it lovable, with citizens who don't merely live here, but are engaged and proud to call it home.
