Unified Police Department has been tracking the accidents that occur along the Herriman strip of the Mountain View Corridor. Surprisingly, the leading cause of accidents, 35%, are animal related. Red lights and following too closely tied for the second common cause with both falling in at 12.5%. The City has been working with Unified Police Department to increase patrols along Mountain View Corridor, 13400 South, 6000 West, 11800 South as well as Herriman Parkway. Is Your Indoor Pet Protected from Rabies?

Whether your pet is an indoor or an outdoor pet, they should be vaccinated to prevent being infected by the rabies virus. Many people think their indoor animals don't need to be vaccinated for rabies, but even indoor cats can be exposed to bats even if they don't step outside because a bat can enter the home via rafters or chimneys.

If you suspect your pet was exposed to the rabies virus, and their vaccination is NOT current, they may have to spend 4 to 6 months in quarantine at an approved facility. This can be quite costly because you would be charged for daily boarding as well as any other applicable fees. If you are unable to pay for quarantine time, your pet would have to be euthanized and then tested for the disease.

Rabies is a preventable disease but is highly infectious if you or a pet is bitten or exposed to it. Raccoons, skunks, bats and foxes are carriers of the rabies virus. Recently the Salt Lake County Health Department had three bats test positive for rabies. If a human is bitten they must promptly receive the rabies vaccine. Once humans exhibit symptoms of the rabies virus, the person rarely survives, even with treatment.

Per Herriman City ordinance: Any animal potentially exposed to rabies virus by a wild or domestic mammal or a bat shall be regarded as having been exposed to rabies pending successful completion of testing and/or quarantine of the biting animal.

A. Unvaccinated: Unvaccinated dogs, cats, and ferrets exposed to a rabid animal shall be euthanized immediately. If the owner is unwilling to have this done, the animal shall be placed in quarantine for up to six (6) months in a location agreeable to the director and monitored by a veterinarian, at the owner's expense, and vaccinated one month before being released.

B. Vaccinated: Dogs, cats, and ferrets that are currently vaccinated shall be revaccinated immediately, kept under the owner's control and observed for forty-five (45) days.

C. Livestock: Livestock shall be handled as per the current compendium of animal rabies control.

Rabies vaccinations can last 1-3 years depending on the animal and the vaccine. Contact your veterinarian to get your pet up-to-date on their rabies vaccinations. Winter Heating Safety

As we approach the winter months, UFA encourages home occupants to ensure their home is adequately prepared for the cold weather. The majority of residential fires do occur between the months of December and February. We encourage you to have your furnaces inspected by qualified technicians to be sure they are in good working order. It is also recommended that you change your filters every 2-3 months. Also, please exercise caution when using space heaters around your home. Make sure only one is plugged into an outlet and that all flammables are away from the heater. The same advice goes for fireplaces and wood burning stoves. Ensure they are in good working order, that flammables are kept at least 3 feet away and that ashes are properly disposed. 

Plan to Succeed

What is the value of requiring a review of construction plans before a permit can be issued and work started? That's a valid question since the review takes time to complete. Let's try to answer the most important and sometimes less obvious reasons.

We are all human and can make mistakes when designing, even simple designs like a shed or fence. Sometimes those mistakes come back to haunt us later. Even professional designers appreciate the fact that a fresh set of eyes have reviewed their project. It's easier to make changes on a plan when it's on paper rather than after it is built.

For example, sheds are only allowed at certain locations on the lot in relation to the property line and proximity to the home. Fences cannot block the clear view on a corner.

On more complex structures such as homes, basement finishes, remodels and detached garages, buildability becomes an issue. If you live in Herriman you've noticed that the wind blows here on occasion. This wind applies pressure to buildings. The larger they are and the steeper the roofs are, the more the wind shear has to be addressed.

Other concerns determine if the 'rise and tread' of the stairs is correct to avoid a tripping hazard? Is there tempered (safety) glass in all the required locations? Is the insulation the correct thickness for the climate? Are there guardrails of sufficient strength? In townhouses and apartments, are the firewalls (occupancy separation walls) designed correctly to provide the protection for the residents on both sides?

We verify escape routes to ensure that exit windows are installed in bedrooms, doors swing in the right direction, and stairs and hallways are of adequate width. We also review the electrical, mechanical, plumbing, and the 'building envelope' insulation. Many of these requirements also relate to retail stores and offices.

We are here to help residents understand the complexity of the plan review process. You can see there are many important elements we are tasked with examining. In the Herriman City Building Department, each of our staff are part of a team that ensures buildings are safe where residents live, work, and play.
