Council Corner

Welcome to 2016! As a city council, we bid goodbye to our former Council Members Mike Day and Matt Robinson as they honorably completed their terms of service. In the eight years of their leadership, our city experienced many changes, growth and opportunity. During this time, Herriman City welcomed the new Herriman Library, J.L. Sorenson Recreation Center, Herriman High School and Rosecrest Fire Station #123. Under their leadership, Herriman Parkway, 5600 West and Anthem Park Boulevard moved from concepts into reality. We attracted many restaurants, service businesses and a new grocery store, significantly increasing our sales tax revenue. Our city transitioned to district service by Unified Police Department, announced the future Salt Lake Community College and pulled together during fires and floods. Winston Churchill said, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." Matt and Mike gave untold hours of service, enriching residents' lives and weaving Herriman City into their own lives and hearts as well.

We welcome newly elected Council Members Jared Henderson and Nicole Martin to public service. With their Oath of Office ceremony completed on Monday, January 4th, our newly-formed council is ready to begin working together. With the economic development foundation that has been laid before, we anticipate announcing more exciting projects this year. Our residents will see progress on our new city hall, with a scheduled completion in summer of 2017, and the extension of Herriman Parkway from 6000 West to 6400 West. Future meetings will include updates to city ordinances, approval of city projects and guiding city policy.

One of the key responsibilities of the council is approving a balanced budget. The budget process generally begins in April and ends in June. We will carefully weigh all anticipated revenue and expenditures to ensure we continue our healthy financial status in 2016. We invite you to attend these meetings and share your input on projects and budget proposals.

City Council meetings are open to the public; they are generally scheduled on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. The work session, where staff and council members discuss upcoming issues together, is open for public observation. It generally begins at 5:00 p.m. and is followed by our regular council meeting at 7:00 p.m. At the beginning of each regular meeting, the public is encouraged to bring any matter to the attention of the council. We appreciate the participation of engaged citizens and hope you'll make time to observe your city government in action.

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Herriman Parkway Phase 3



Herriman City is preparing to start construction of the Herriman Parkway Phase 3 project, which will extend Herriman Parkway from 6000 West to about 500 feet west of 6400 West. The project is currently in the bidding process and we anticipate construction to begin as early as mid-February and reach substantial completion by this fall.

The project is intended to provide infrastructure to support additional development including a new subdivision called Creek Ridge, which is situated on the south west corner of the future intersection of 6400 West and Herriman Parkway.

As shown in the graphic, this project is broken up into three parts, 1) Base Bid (Herriman Parkway Extension) 2) Bid Alternate 1 (South Extension), and 3) Bid Alternate 2 (North Extension). This was done to segment the project into smaller portions in order to ensure project costs stay below project budget. Initial estimates indicate the project budget will allow for the Base Bid portion of the project only.

Meet Your Animal Control Officer

Herriman's assigned Salt Lake County Animal Control Officer, Michelle Jones, had a very busy year. Unlike most jurisdictions, Herriman has an animal control officer that is dedicated solely to its city. In 2015, Jones responded to over 1,100 calls, completed nearly 600 park and area patrols, licensed over 100 animals and microchipped dozens of animals on-site from her truck.

Jones greatly enjoys working with Herriman City and the community. She says there is a great sense of "teamwork" that goes on between the city and members of the community. As part of this community, Jones says, "I strive to educate pet owners, and help them become better owners by offering them solutions to problems I may come across." For this upcoming year, Jones would like to coordinate at least one licensing and veterinary clinic in Herriman with Salt Lake County Animal Services.

During the cold season, Jones cautions owners to avoid ice covered ponds, the thin ice and freezing water is dangerous for pets. As a reminder, Salt Lake County Animal Services offers vaccinations, rabies clinics, free microchipping events, free monthly feline fix events and more to the residents of Herriman. Garbage Collection Day Changes

Herriman Friday - All properties east of Rose Canyon Rd/6400 W and south of Herriman Hwy. All properties north of Herriman Hwy and west of the western property boundaries of Lazy Creek Cv.

Herriman Thursday - Rose Canyon Rd starting from 13400 S and going directly south to the Herriman City boundary, and follows the Herriman boundary east until Porter Rockwell Blvd and continues to Mountain View Corridor. Then continues along Mountain View Corridor to Rosecrest Rd south of Rosecrest Rd from Mountain View Corridor to Mirabella Dr west of Mirabella from Rosecrest Rd to 13400 S, and along 13400 S to Rose Canyon Rd.

Herriman Wednesday - Starting at the intersection of Main St and Rosecrest Rd, follow Main St to 6400 W. Then continuing south along 6400 W to 13400 S, and continues east along 13400 S to Mirabella Dr. The boundary meanders southeast along Mirabella Dr to Rosecrest Rd and follows Rosecrest Rd southwest to the Mountain View Corridor. Then continues southwest along Mountain View Corridor to Porter Rockwell Blvd and follows Porter Rockwell Blvd to the Herriman boundary. The boundary continues north along the Herriman boundary until reaching the intersection of Rosecrest Rd (5600 W) and 13400 S. From that intersection continue north along Rosecrest Rd to the starting intersection of Main St and Rosecrest Rd

Herriman Tuesday - Starting at the intersection of Main St and Rosecrest Rd, follow Main St west which continues to Herriman Hwy until Lazy Creek Cv. Then continues north including all properties on Lazy Creek Cv and continuing northeast along the northern properties of Lazy Creek Cv which connects with the Herriman boundary. Moving north the boundary continues along the Herriman boundary to the intersection of 13400 S and Rosecrest Rd. From 13400 S and Rosecrest Rd the boundary continues north to the intersection at Main St and Rosecrest.

Cold Water Related Emergencies

As the freezing winter months and record low temperatures continue bringing more snow and ice, the concern for safety around our ponds and waterways increases. Nationally, emergency crews respond to hundreds of cold water and ice rescue incidents every year. Tragically, more than 50% of fatalities in these incidents are the very rescuers themselves.

The fishing pond at the Cove, Blackridge Reservoir and other popular recreation areas nearby have each, in recent years, had incidents of tragedy and survival. Just this week Unified Fire Authority crews responded to the pond in the Cove and were successful in rescuing a dog named Tucker. Out for a walk with the family, Tucker yielded to his playful canine instincts and dashed across the frozen pond to chase ducks. He soon fell helplessly through the thin ice and was stranded defenselessly in the frigid water. Fortunately the family quickly called 911. Rescue crews soon arrived and immediately sprang into action, quickly reuniting Tucker with loved ones and a much needed warm bath.

Unfortunately, cheerful outcomes like this are often overshadowed by tragedy, with similar situations ending in disaster when the call for help is delayed or even worse- when a bystander is injured or dies attempting a rescue too hastily.

Please consider these important steps when faced with a cold water or ice related emergency:

1. If you witness a person or animal in danger, Call 911 immediately! Don't delay, even if it appears to be a simple rescue. Icy water will quickly incapacitate even the strongest swimmer and could drastically reduce the possibility of self-rescue.
2. Don't jump in after someone. The natural motivation to help others and the urgency of the situation can influence poor decisions. Take a deep breath and stay calm.
3. From the shore, you might see a safe way out that a person struggling in the freezing water doesn't notice. If verbal instructions are unsuccessful and the victim is unable to rescue themselves, bystanders should immediately call 911 then consider the following 4 rescue options:
 - a. Reach- Extending an arm, pole, tree branch, ladder or any other object to a victim from shore can be a safe way to help a person in danger.
 - b. Throw- If the victim is out of reach find something to throw to the victim, preferably something that may be used to pull him to safety, such as a rope or extension cord. If an inflatable object or other flotation device is nearby, throw it and encourage the victim to hold on until help arrives. The fear of drowning can overwhelm a persons' ability to think clearly and often causes panic. The best rescue methods are usually performed safely from a dock or shore, making the next two rescue techniques used as a last resort.
 - c. Row- If there is nothing to extend or throw to the victim, try to locate a boat, raft or tube to safely get to the victim. Try to keep the person calm and encourage him to hang on to the side of the boat while you return to shore. The rush to get a victim out of the water could place rescuers in danger if the boat capsizes.
 - d. Go- If these rescue attempts are still unsuccessful and emergency responders haven't arrived, the final option for a bystander is to "go" into the water after a person. This is clearly the most dangerous technique and should be avoided if at all possible.

Many lives have been saved by the heroic actions of others. However, even with the best of intentions, too many have tragically died attempting to rescue a pet or loved one.

Herriman is a beautiful city with endless opportunities for outdoor recreation. Thankfully, most of us will never encounter this kind of disaster. But for those who find themselves in an emergency situation, please remember that calling 911 to get emergency crews coming is the single most important decision you can make, and will give a person in danger the best chance of survival.

Bathroom Exhaust Fans & Dryer Vents

House designs are constantly changing for the good. One fairly new design is, the popular trend of a separate toilet room. This is a separate room with a door that contains only a toilet. It's a very popular design for many reasons. This room always contains the bath fan. Except...the bath fan is intended to remove moisture, not odors.

So I'll be brief, when bathing or showering make sure the fan is running. If the fan is located in a 'toilet room', make sure the door remains open. This is especially critical if the bathroom doesn't have a window. Don't run the risk of moisture build up, which encourages the development of black mold. Remember that an exhaust fan in a bathroom isn't installed for the removal of odor, but for removing humidity created from showering and bathing.

While we are on the topic of ventilation, periodic maintenance is needed at the clothes dryer exhaust on the outside wall of your house. Enough lint gets past the dryer lint filter to completely close the outside exhaust vent. The accumulation of lint can pack tight enough to completely seal off the dryer vent stopping its ability to exhaust all the moist air from the drying process. This can restrict its efficiency and limit its useful life expectancy. It also creates a fire hazard since dryer lint is extremely flammable.

These two maintenance items will keep your home safe, healthy and efficient.
