History of Herriman Events

We're entering a busy and delightful time of year for city staff, volunteers and residents as we look forward to expressing patriotism on Memorial Day and celebrating our city's heritage at the PRCA Rodeo and Fort Herriman Days. Traditions are important to communities as we reinforce values and culture, bringing people together to reconnect and create memories. Despite only seventeen years as an incorporated city, our traditions are based on many decades of history.

On Memorial Day we honor men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military as well as remember loved ones who have passed away. In Herriman, dedicated resident volunteers place a flag and plaque in honor of each veteran buried in our cemetery. The display is impressive and evokes thoughts of gratitude toward those who served our country. The American Legion Post 140 conducts a special ceremony at the Herriman Cemetery to honor those who served with patriotic music and poetry, a 21-gun salute and the playing of "Taps."

Former Council Member Raquel DeLuca recalled the history of the Main Street Park and Lion's Club Memorial Day breakfast, "We had a little playground and we built the pavilion so we could have the Lion's breakfast there. That was the center of our city; that was our park." Today, the Chuck Wagon Breakfast event has been continued at the historic Main Street Park by city staff, elected officials, Unified Fire and Unified Police personnel and volunteers.

The PRCA Rodeo is a thrilling regional event! Without the W&M Butterfield Park, this tradition of the Wild West could never have arrived in Herriman. In 1998, Wayne Butterfield and a few insightful residents discussed their desire to have an arena facility for youth to use and enjoy. He went to the town council with his proposal, then after city incorporation Wayne and Mildred Butterfield donated 60 acres of land as an expansive city park now known as W&M Butterfield Park. That park was built with donations of land, equipment, cash and labor to create the park and rodeo grounds. In 2004, Rosecrest, Inc. donated the performing arts pavilion we use today.

This year's rodeo includes a Kiddie Korral preceding the main event, where Herriman's youth can enjoy a petting zoo, stick horse races, barrel racing, calf dummy roping, Mighty Bucky, and the animal train. On Saturday afternoon, a Special Needs Rodeo is facilitated by volunteers to allow individuals with special needs the opportunity to experience all the thrills of the Kiddie Korral in a safe and assisted setting. To many staff and volunteers, this is the absolute highlight of the PRCA Rodeo weekend.

In early years, Fort Herriman Days was organized by church congregations and held at the Main Street Park. Over time it lapsed but was revived by resident volunteers, including

Push to Survive Open House



Push to Survive is a large scale Public Service Announcement targeted at reducing the mortality rate of Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest (OHCA) for the citizens of Salt Lake County. Each year, 480,000 people in the United States experience OHCA. Without bystander CPR being performed, 92% of these victims will not survive. With proper Hands-Only CPR, and modern standards of care being rendered, 50% of these victims can survive and return to a normal life.

Unified Fire Authority will be providing free Hands-Only CPR training to the citizens of Riverton, Herriman and neighboring communities. During the month of June, Unified Fire Authority's Fire Station 121 will be welcoming our citizens into our station to educate them in this easy to learn, and imperative to know skill with "Push to Survive". At the same time, we look forward to the opportunity to meet the public we serve and get to know our neighbors.

"Push to Survive" will be delivered on an on-going rotation at the station during the open house hours. Please stop by, spend 10 minutes learning how to save a life and get to know your firefighters. You can stop by any time during the open house and take the class. We look forward to meeting you and need your help when tragedy strikes.

Thank you to the Salt Lake County Sherriff's Office and Unified Police Department for a successful training for our citizens on how to respond to an active shooter. The U.S. Department of Justice Federal Bureau of Investigation suggests that in the event of an active shooter, you have three options: 1. Run-have an escape route and plan in mind and leave your belongings behind. 2. Hide-hide in an area out of the shooter's view and lock or block the entry to your hiding places. 3. Fight-this is a last resort and only when your life is in imminent danger. When law enforcement arrives, drop items in your hands, raise your hands and spread your fingers. Keep your hands visible at all times. This helps law enforcement to see that you are not the shooter or a threat.

Be Ready Herriman also participated in the Utah Wildfire Preparedness Day. We are grateful to our many residents who participate with us in our drills and continue to be prepared to help in the event of an emergency.

If you're interested in participating with Be Ready Herriman our next meeting will be held on May 26th where UPD will discuss how CERT has been beneficial in helping UPD during missing person searches. We will then take June and July off for the summer, and will begin meetings again in August.

Parking Permit Program

On April 13, 2016, the Herirman City Council approved Ordinance 2016-13 that approved a declaration of designation for parking permits in the neighborhood surrounding Blackridge Reservoir.

The "Parking by Permit ONLY" signs have been placed in these designated areas, allowing visitors to identify which streets are included in the parking permit program area. In order to park on these designated streets, each vehicle will need to have a parking pass. Passes are only available to residents that live within the permit area boundaries.



The parking restrictions will be enforced from May 1st - Labor Day, 9:00am - 9:00pm.

Wasatch Front Updates

Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District provides Salt Lake Valley Landfill fee waiver vouchers for WFWRD customers, and are valid for loads up to 4 ft x 8 ft, or the size of a pickup truck sized trailer. These vouchers are only valid for residential loads that do not contain any hazardous waste materials. These vouchers are available at Herriman City Hall.

Herriman residents are reminded that regardless of their waste and recycling collection day, green waste is collected on Mondays in Herriman.

We ask residents to remember that green (yard) waste should NEVER be placed in the blue recycling cans. Placing green waste in the recycling cans contaminates the recycling load and makes the recyclable materials unusable.

New Homes Burn Faster

Why are homes burning faster today than 30 years ago?

The reason is attributed to the materials used to build the home and the materials inside it. In today's construction we use manufactured wood which is stronger and more uniform, but less fire resistant than the real and natural wood we used in the 70's and 80's. We are also furnishing our homes with furniture using synthetic materials like polyester and polyurethane, causing homes to burn faster and hotter.

Research shows that 30 years ago, you had about 17 minutes to escape from a house fire. Today it's down to 3 or 4 minutes. In a field test done with modern furniture the room was filled with smoke and flashed over within 3-1/2 minutes. By comparison, older or legacy furniture did not flash over until close to 30 minutes. Luckily in Herriman, the UFA has impressively quick response times to arrive at and start fighting a fire.

While the building code is intended to make houses safer, it has to take into account all variables such as earthquakes, fires, or other natural disasters. Those variables make it hard for products to be affordable and protect us against all possible scenarios.

So what can we do to keep our families safe?

- Keep furniture a safe distance away from heating and electrical equipment.
- Prevent damage to electrical cords and inspect them often.
- Take precautions while cooking.
- Have a fire escape plan for your family.
- Learn how to use a fire extinguisher.
- Get out as quickly as possible in case of a fire.

Here at the Herriman City Building Department we consider ourselves the "First Preventers". Our staff of qualified professionals work hard to help keep your family safe by ensuring the most current building codes are followed when new construction occurs. We hope you will also do your part to keep your family and property protected.

OHV Street Use

As weather warms up outside, several of us begin preparing for our highly anticipated outdoor activities we have planned for the months ahead. Along with campers and trailers we also start to see more Off-Highway Vehicles (OHV's) on the city roadways.

The approach of the summer season leads to frequently asked questions such as, "Can I drive my OHV in Herriman City if it is street legal?"

According to Utah code 41-6A-1509(1)(b)(i) or (ii), an insured street legal ATV can only be operated in a county of the first class, such as Salt Lake County, if the local controlling highway authority, in this case Herriman City, has designated a road for street legal ATV use. Currently Herriman City has no such designated roadways. This means that it is illegal to operate OHV's within Herriman City; even if they are street-legal according to the Motor Vehicle Division's standards. Operating an OHV within Herriman City could result in the driver receiving a citation and the OHV being impounded. This does not change the compliance standards for implements of farming and husbandry and their ability to operate on roadways within their agricultural capacity.

OHV's were not intended or designed for operations among heavy motor vehicles. An important factor to consider is the protection you enjoy in a motor vehicle designed for front, side and rear impact that's absent in the OHV. The OHV design is not engineered for brake and evade maneuvers that may be necessary to avoid a pedestrian or bicyclist. These are just some examples of the dangers associated with operating off-highway vehicles in an urban setting.

Unified Police Department and Herriman City appreciates your understanding and cooperation with this matter. As your local police agency, our goal is to ensure the members of our community are safe. We hold dear the community in which we serve and hope you all have a safe and enjoyable summer. Vaccination Clinic

Are your pets up-to-date on their vaccinations? Do you need to renew or license a pet? Salt Lake County Animal Services is taking its show on the road! We're setting up a temporary vaccination and licensing clinic at the W&M Butterfield Park Rodeo Grounds, 14101 S. 6400 W., on June 25 from 9:00am-1:00pm. Pre-register now!

When licensing or renewing a pet's license, citizens in Herriman and Riverton Cities qualify for a free voucher to receive: (1) free vaccination, free rabies vaccination and free microchip. Additional low cost vaccinations will be available. If your pet's license has expired, Animal Services will waive the late fee ONLY at this 1-day event. Just a reminder all dogs, cats and ferrets must be licensed in Herriman City.

Any resident may attend the clinic with their dogs, cats and/or ferrets. Bring proof of previous rabies vaccinations, license & microchip. To speed up the process pre-register with your Animal Control Officer, Michelle Jones, mjones@slco.org or call her at 801-381-5832.
