Redemption Bar & Grill | The Salty Pineapple

Best Hawaiian - Salty Pineapple:
"We've got a fair selection of traditional Hawaiian grills along the Wasatch Front, but there's something that stands out about Salty Pineapple...All we can say is, it's been a long time since

we've visited Herriman this much. Lately, the go-to order is the pineapple jalapeño chicken with the kalua pork, but their katsu chicken and teriyaki beef are also fantastic."

Clint Smith

Herriman City Councilmember Clint Smith, who serves as Draper City Fire Chief, was recognized by Unified Fire Authority (UFA) for responding quickly to a house fire near his home on Sunday, November 15th.

UFA public information officer Ryan Love told reporters on scene that "Chief Smith...got here immediately. He saw the smoke, put on his turnout coat, and went to work."

What did Herriman City do with the CARES Act?

Receiving about \$2.1 million in federal C.A.R.E.S. Act funding, the City set out to help a variety of individuals and organizations within Herriman that have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic throughout the year.

City Shop Around - After the completion of three rounds, the program geared towards directly helping local businesses and residents saw approximately \$1 million dollars worth of vouchers redeemed.

Schools - To help protect teachers and assist students in online learning, \$51,000 worth of personal protective equipment kits and laptops were organized and delivered to teachers throughout the city (see pictures above).

Business PPE Kits - To help ensure workers were protected and businesses could remain open, \$16,000 worth of personal protective equipment kits were distributed (see *Giving Back*, page 5).

Other Services - First responder PPE kits, a senior citizen technology assistance program, and other services benefited and protected the community.

When are they going to plow my street?



High-traffic roadways, school zones, hills, arterial, and collector roads are the top priority for snow plowing. As long as the snow falls, the City's first goal is to keep the main roads open. Once these streets are clear, plow crews will continue on to residential subdivisions, and finally cul-de-sacs. (Please note residential streets may not be plowed until after the snowstorm has subsided, based on the severity of the storm and whether high-traffic roadways have been cleared. Cul-de-sacs carry the lowest volume of traffic, and therefore are generally last to receive plowing.)

Please note that snow cleared from your driveway should be placed in your yard, or on the side of your driveway or park strip, and not in the street or your neighbor's yard. When hiring an independent snowplow service, make sure the contractor is licensed and complies with City Code.

No parking on City streets when there is snow

Herriman City ordinance prohibits parking cars on the street when 1) it is snowing or 2) there is snow on the roads from November-April. This is to allow City snow plows the ability to clear roads of snow to make them safe to drive. If cars are in the way, the plows can't safely plow—it's that simple.

When snow plows have cleared major roadways during or after a storm, they will clear subdivisions and cul-de-sacs. However, plows cannot safely enter and exit cul-de-sacs if there are cars parked on the side of the road.

Just remember this: Keep your car off the road when it's snowing or there is snow on the road, and City crews will work hard to keep our streets clear and safe to drive.

RADON

January is Radon Awareness Month

Radon is a dangerous carcinogen, prevalent in Utah, that can lead to health concerns. Cities located near mountains (including Herriman) tend to have areas of high concentration of radon. Radon is not something that you can see, smell, nor feel. The only way to detect its presence is to test for it. We encourage residents to test their homes for high levels of radon. Levels exceeding 4.0 pCi/L found are particularly concerning per the Environmental Protection Agency.

During December and January, the Utah Radon Coalition is offering free testing to our community if you sign up on their website below. Radon test kits are also available *for free* through January 31 at the Herriman City Hall (while supplies last). After January 31, they will be available to purchase.

CARBON MONOXIDE

Carbon monoxide (CO) is produced when carbon fuel—like wood, gasoline, coal, propane, natural gas, and heating oil—fails to burn completely. In your home (especially basements, kitchens, and garages), this CO can make you and your family sick and can lead to death.

How do I prevent CO poisoning?

Install a CO detector – at least one on each level of the home in the vicinity of sleeping area.

Don't idle your car in the garage, even with the door open. If you want to warm your car up in the winter, pull it out of the garage.

Practice cooking safety. Don't use a charcoal grill, hibachi, or camping stove inside your home

Always have proper ventilation when using gas-powered tools like generators and space heaters.



K9 Memorial Dog Park Groundbreaking

New Mojo mountain bike trail open




Herriman City is pleased to announced the opening of the new Mojo Trail! Mojo is an intermediate, downhill-only mountain bike trail.
