What did your City do in 2020?




The City used federal CARES Act funding to help support our community. Three rounds of the City Shop Around injected over \$900,000 from Herriman Bucks coupons to our local businesses. Herriman City also provided personal protective equipment and other needed materials to our businesses and schools.



The Communications Department rebuilt and refreshed the Herriman.org website.



The Engineering Department developed and adopted several new City master plans.



The Building Department greatly accelerated its transition to working digitally, and even hold building inspections remotely via Facetime and Duo.



The Streets Department laid 345.5 tons of asphalt, swept every Herriman street five times, helped facilitate the Citywide Cleanup, and snowplows over 315 miles of roads.


Angel Hope for Herriman

On September 23, 2020, Herriman resident Christa Benward, along with Herriman City staff, presented to the City Council the concept of a new monument at the Herriman City cemetery. The City Council was very supportive of The Christmas Box Angel Monument, which gives parents who have lost a child a place to grieve and start the healing process.

The City will be providing the land, pedestal, and surrounding landscaping for the statue; however, funding for the statue will need to be raised by the community. Ms. Benward has taken it upon herself to head fundraising efforts for this project but will need the community's support to raise the \$15,500 needed to purchase the statue.

If you would like to contribute towards the purchase of the statue, donations may be made at any Jordan Credit Union to the Angel of Hope in Herriman account. Donations may also be made via Venmo @Christa-Benward. Venmo donations deposit directly to the account at Jordan Credit Union.



The Fleet Department completed 1,240 work orders to keep City vehicles and equipment functioning smoothly.



The Events Department adapted to ever-changing COVID-19 restrictions throughout the year to bring fun events to the community.



The Facilities Department ordered and distributed critical PPE gear for police officers and essential City employees and have outfitted areas in the city hall to be safe for face-to-face contact with the public during COVID-19.



The Parks Department opened Big Bend and L&L Hamilton Parks, broke ground on the K9 Memorial Dog Park, and opened Midas Creek and Rose Creek asphalt trails. They also opened new mountain trails and saved 43% more culinary water compared to last year's peak season.



The Street Lights Department completed 930 work orders and repaired or replaced 30 damaged poles.



Unified Fire Authority further improved response times and maintained its level of service during the pandemic. UFA responded to 1,475 incidents in Herriman in 2020.



The Planning Department is working to update the City's General Plan. They have sought input from the public, staff, and elected officials. More public outreach is planned in coming weeks and months.




Herriman Police continued service uninterrupted through COVID-19. Community engagement has been more limited than HPD would like, but they still found ways to connect with residents. They also honored K9 Hondo, who was killed in the line of duty in February.



The Water Department designed or installed major infrastructure throughout the city and successfully navigated record-high summer water demand in a dry year.

ORDINANCE 2020-34

An ordinance amending and adopting certain changes to Title 10 of the Herriman City Code to include Water Efficiency Standards.

Water Efficiency Standards are based on Locascapes principles that have been modified to meet City requirements.



COLD WEATHER PET TIPS

DRY OFF AND CLEAN

Dry and clean your pet's paws to remove all rock salt, sand, and chemicals used to melt ice which can become embedded in their paws and cause pain.

BRING YOUR PET INSIDE & PROVIDE ADEQUATE SHELTER

Wind chill makes the air colder than the actual temperature reading. Limit your pet's time outdoors to prevent frostbite on ears, tail, and feet, and when outside, provide an insulated, draft-free, south-facing shelter.

BEWARE OF ANTIFREEZE

Antifreeze tends to collect on driveways and roadways during the winter. Although it smells and tastes good to your pet, it is highly poisonous and lethal.



Snow Removal: What's My Responsibility?

Sometimes it may be unclear as to what your responsibility is when it comes to clearing snow versus what Herriman City does. Below we have provided a few items to ensure snow is cleared to prevent any possible accidents to assist in time of emergencies:

- It is extremely important to keep fire hydrants accessible to assist fire crews in the events of an emergency. The homeowner who has a hydrant on their property is responsible for keeping the hydrant clear at all times
- It is the responsibility of the homeowner to clear all sidewalks adjacent to their property for the safety of school children, elderly, and the general public. Snow should be removed within one hour after the snowfall ceases, or prior to major foot traffic, such as before or after school
- Snow or ice in front of mailboxes can make it difficult for letter carriers to safely deliver the mail. Maintaining a clear path to the mailbox, including steps, porches, walkways, and street approach is the responsibility of the homeowners and will help letter carriers maintain consistent delivery service
