


#### Count of Responses by Date and Status









#### Responses by Age Group










#### How interested are you in subscribing to internet services on a city owned open access fiber network?

### Summary of Comments

- The overwhelmingly strong interest in an open access network is reflected in the comments as many understand the critical nature of reliable broadband access.
- Specific details about prices and speeds are desired, among those who indicated interest and those who opposed.
- Among those who indicated disinterest in the project, a lack of understanding around how the project will be funded and that it will actually promote competition and choice.
- Customer education can likely further interest and support.
