Council Corner

Law Enforcement Property Tax Increase

Local governments have many responsibilities and services. The City Council is tasked with representing residents in prioritizing those services within the bounds of its financial means. We believe one of our core priorities is to ensure public safety, a major part of which is maintaining a quality police force. To be able to do so in coming years, we believe the law enforcement property tax entity, the Herriman City Safety Enforcement Area (HC-SEA), will need an increased tax rate.

This month, property owners will receive a mailed or emailed notice showing a proposed rate increase for the HCSEA as well as some other entities that the City doesn't control. The City Council has voted to send a notice for an HCSEA increase of up to 15%, but we want

public input before a final decision is made on August 22. Depending on feedback over the next several weeks, the Council will implement an increase of anywhere from 0% to 15%.

We do not make this decision lightly. We know these are hard times economically, and everyone is burdened from all directions. It seems every company is raising its prices and passing the cost along to you, the consumer. The City feels it too. Costs for operations and projects are constantly going up. The City budget is based on taxpayer dollars, and we understand our obligation to use that money responsibly. The City has taken measures to reduce costs, including delaying some expenses and even staff hirings as long as possible.

To put it simply, there are three main factors that affect operating costs: growth, the salary market, and inflation. Utah state property tax law is set up in a way that taxing entities, like cities, automatically receive more revenue from population growth, but the law doesn't account for market continued on page 2


changes or inflation. Inflation and market changes are outpacing the increased revenue from growth, so an adjustment is still needed to pay for critical expenses like additional officers and equipment, vehicle purchases and replacements, and saving for a future public safety facility.

You may be asking "What would an increase pay for? Doesn't the City already get more revenue with growth? How do property taxes work?" or other valid questions. There are answers to these and other great questions that we don't have enough space to cover in this article, but you can find more explanations on the City's website at www.herriman.org/property-tax.

Please take a few minutes this month to have your questions answered, consider how much of an increase you think is appropriate, and give us feedback either on the webpage or in a public comment at the August 22 meeting. Together, we will continue to build a vibrant safe, and sustainable city that we are proud to call home.

Considerations

- Amount of revenue "lost" to inflation since 2019: \$1,400,000
- Average new growth per year: \$554,000 (9%)
- Police salary market has outpaced inflation (33% increase since 2018)
- New growth requires additional resources and services

Do Your Trees Hang Low?

City code authorizes the City to prune, remove, and replant street trees. However, it is still the responsibility of the homeowner to water and care for the trees in their park strip. Pruning needs to be done carefully (preferably by an ISA-certified arborist) to ensure the health of the tree is maintained and to prevent



future problems with access to streets and sidewalks. Tree overhang should always be trimmed to the minimum of seven feet above sidewalks and 13 and a half feet above street pavement. And please note that topping trees is illegal.

There is a list of approved and prohibited street trees found at *herriman.org/trees*. This is important because different trees have different characteristics. Any street tree questions can be directed to the City Arborist at 801-410-3653.




May 24 - Juan Pineda



Renting Out Your Basement

Have you thought about renting out your basement? If you are the primary resident in a residential or agricultural zone and your lot is large than 6,000 square feet, you are allowed to apply for an internal accessory dwelling unit. However, there are a few steps you need to complete, including the submission of an application (see herriman.org/ iadu) and approval from the City's Planning and Zoning Department.

Residents will often submit the application at the same time as a building per-

mit application is filed to finish the basement. If the basement is already finished, you'll need to check if an inspection has already been completed. Otherwise, you will need to apply and receive the required inspections so the City can certify that the dwelling unit meets all building safety and fire codes.

If you are adding a separate entrance to the basement, you will also need to apply for a basement walkout permit, which may be done at the same time to save money on permit fees. Visit herriman.org/building for application details.

Avoid watering your landscape during the hottest hours of the day (10 am until 6 pm) to minimize evaporation


