My family and I love living in Herriman. We were drawn to the area for a variety of reasons such as; the open spaces, its proximity to Yellow Fork Canyon, the wonderful people, the Heritage, History and Pride that gives Herriman a unique culture and feel. As time goes on, more and more people have been and will be drawn to Herriman. That growth is inevitable and will continue for years to come. The pace of that growth has quickened and we are now nearly back to the rate of growth that was experienced in the "building boom" 10 years ago. The fast pace of growth presents challenges but also tremendous opportunities. The Council and city staff are actively pursuing opportunities that will enhance our quality of life and build on Herriman's rich heritage. A few of the areas we are working on are:

- Economic/Commercial Development. Municipalities in Utah are largely dependent on sales tax for revenue. We have already seen construction begin on several new businesses and have several large scale projects underway including the new Towne Center, REAL Salt Lake Training Facility and surrounding commercial/office park, and the Anthem Commercial Center.

- Transportation. Connectivity of roads and traffic flow are important factors for businesses and residents. We have many new roads that have been built, are under construction and more that are in the planning phases. We are working with UDOT, UTA and other agencies to improve roads and expand other transportation opportunities. Herriman's Streets Department has a maintenance program/schedule and is hard at work.

- Recreation. With the improvement of existing and the addition of new parks, trails and facilities, Herriman has a lot to offer. Recreation is a big part of our economic plan. From sports fields to hiking/biking trails, the Towne Center ice rink and the rodeo grounds we are looking to bring visitors into the city limits to shop and play.

- Community Pride. We are looking to place reminders of what Herriman is around the city. The new City Hall will include a "History Walk" to remind us of our roots. A large park and gathering area will give us a place for community events and activities. Plaques and monuments will hopefully provide reminders of our rich heritage and reinforce the "Herriman feel".

- Residential. Herriman is a great place to live and others want to live here too. It is important to balance the type of housing and the areas it is located. We have (and will continue to) take measures that will help insure the quality of residential developments.

We will continue to work on these and other areas to make sure that Herriman continues to be the place that we love to live in.

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Disc Golf Course

The disc golf course at Rosecrest could potentially end up 4 holes shorter due to ongoing concerns with trespassing on private property and disrespectful behavior towards homeowners. Currently, disc golf play on holes #1, #8, #9 and #18 is suspended. The course is being modified to improve safety of park users, course users and to minimize the opportunity for discs to enter resident properties. Over the last few weeks, there have been complaints that some patrons of the course were ignoring "No Trespassing" signs and climbing fences to retrieve their discs from residents' backyards. Such intrusion causes the surrounding community to feel a loss of privacy and an uneasiness having strangers enter their yards.

When this course was opened in early spring, the intent was to provide a family-friendly course throughout a park like environment. The course went through a process during the design phase in order to have as little impact on the neighbors as possible. Members of the disc golfing community, engineers, resident players and city staff were all involved in laying out the course in a manner conducive to the surrounding area while still providing some challenges of play.



Once the course opened, additional feedback was provided and adjustments were made on a few holes that would reduce the impact to surrounding homes and a neighboring horse arena.

Staff continues to work with members of the community to address concerns and minimize impact, but we request assistance of the players in our efforts as well.

Please adhere to the following:

- 1-Several holes have two areas to tee from. It is important that players play the tee box that is aligned with their skill level.
 - 2-Safety first! Never throw when players or park users are within range. Parks users have the right of way.
 - 2-Please do not climb neighboring fences in the event your disc enters a private residence.
 - 3-Lost discs may be turned in to Herriman City for pick up by their owner (contact information on the disc is the best way to identify it).
 - 4-Always be courteous and respectful of neighboring properties. This is a multi-use area. Please respect our neighbors, the environment and others.
 - 5-Remember that this is a family friendly course and conduct yourself accordingly. Be courteous and have fun.
- This course has been a popular amenity among our community and our hope is that we can make adjustments that will satisfy both the homeowners and players alike.

Rattlesnake Safety

As the warmer weather approaches, it is time to hit the trails and enjoy the sunshine and the great outdoors. Just remember that you are not the only one enjoying basking in the sun's rays. Rattlesnakes are also heading out of their dens to take in the warmth of the sun. Though rattlesnakes can be found anywhere on the hillside, they often are near logs or rocks where mice and other small rodents are likely to hang out. But there are those times when you may run in to them right on the trail. They are active during daylight hours, and when it gets really hot outside, they have the potential to become active at night.

So what do you do if you come across a rattlesnake on a trail? Leave the snake alone. Do not harass it or attempt to engage it in any way. Stay at least five feet from the snake. If you come across an agitated rattlesnake that is coiled and rattling, stay away and move on. Rattlesnakes can strike about 1/3 of their body length, and they don't always rattle before they bite. If you happen to live along the hillside and find a rattlesnake in your yard, if it will not leave, you can call for help and have it removed. The Division of Wildlife Resources has referred Reptile Rescue at 801-860-2497 as a great resource for removal in the Salt Lake Valley.

KEY POINTS FROM THE ADOPTED HERRIMAN CITY BUDGET 2016-2017

The total general fund budget for 2016-2017 is \$15,728,533. All of our City funds meet the state requirements to be balanced. There is no current change in property tax rates. Our Fund balance (our reserve fund) is expected to be at 19.87% at the close of next year.

City Council focus for the upcoming budget year will be on Capital Projects, Economic Development, Budget, Future Vision and Recreation Amenities.





All of our funds meet the state requirement to be balanced. There is no proposed change in property tax rates. Property Tax, Sales Tax and Franchise are projected increasing only because of population growth. Impact fees are budgeted to remain the same, however, studies are underway to evaluate those fees and determine if they should be increased or decreased. Water user fees are expected to increase 4%.

New Staff

- * It is proposed by this budget that we will increase our Full Time Equivalent employees from 89.95 to 99.6.
- * An Administrative Tech III has been 50% Administration and 50% Communications and will be moved to 100% Communications.
- * Administrative Technician will be hired to replace our City Treasurer who moved to the Finance Department. This replacement was not made at the time of the move.
- * The Deputy Recorder has been 50% Administration and 50% Recorder and will now be moved to full-time Recorder and will add the duties of planning commission agendas and minutes.
- * An Administration Tech will be added to replace the employee that was moved to full-time in Passports.
- * An Administrative Tech will be hired and will be working 50% for Administration and 50% for the Water Department.
- * Streets will add one full-time and 2 seasonal employees.
- * Parks will be adding 2 seasonal employees.
- * Building Department Intern, this is a half-time with no benefits intern position.
- * Engineering Department will add an intern two days per week.
- * An employee that has been 30 hours per week in Planning will become full-time.
- * An employee that has been 50% Planning and 50% Economic Development will become full-time Economic Development.
- * Planning will add a half-time intern.

Employees will be given an average of 3% increase.

Health Insurance is expected to increase 11% and the employees will maintain 80/20 cost sharing with the City.





Utah Retirement contributions will not change this year.

Pool Safety

I came across this information from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission and thought it contained important information.

The July 4th holiday has traditionally seen an increase in the number of fatal pool and spa drownings, as compared with fatal drownings during other weeks. Data compiled from media reports by the USA Swimming Foundation for the last four years indicate that an average of 23 children fatally drowned in pools and spas during the week of July 4th, 2015 (June 30th through July 6th). In 2014, there were 21 fatal drownings reported involving children younger than 15 during the week of the July 4th holiday; 23 fatal drownings were reported in 2013; 30 fatal drownings were reported in 2012; 24 fatal drownings were reported in 2011; and 25 fatal drownings were reported in 2010.

"Fatal drownings don't look like they do in the movies – they're silent, happen in an instant and devastate families for a lifetime," said Chairman Elliot F. Kaye. "There are simple steps, though, that families can take to be sure that their time around the water is safer this holiday weekend: adults need to be designated as Water Watchers and ensure their only task is to watch kids in the water. Fences with locking gates should completely enclose the pool, and kids need to be signed up for swim lessons with certified instructors. Drowning is 100 percent preventable."

Pool Safely is CPSC's public education and outreach effort to prevent drownings and entrapments in swimming pools and spas.

Here are Pool Safely's Top 10 Tips to Stay Safer Around the Pool or Spa this Holiday Weekend:

1. Learn how to swim and teach your child how to swim.
2. Install a four-foot or taller fence around the entire perimeter of the pool and use self-closing and self-latching gates; ask your neighbors to do the same at their pools.
3. Never leave a child unattended in or near a pool or spa and always watch your children closely around all bodies of water.
4. Designate a Water Watcher to supervise children in the pool or spa. This person should not be reading, texting, using a smart phone or be otherwise distracted. Adults can take turns being a Water Watcher.
5. If a child is missing, look for him or her in the pool or spa first.
6. Keep children away from pool drains, pipes and other openings to avoid entrapments.
7. Ensure any public pool and spa you use has drain covers that comply with federal safety requirements, and, if you do not know, ask the pool manager if the facility complies with the "VGB Act."
8. Learn how to perform CPR on children and adults, and update those skills regularly.
9. Install and use a lockable safety cover on your spa.
10. Have lifesaving equipment such as a life ring, float or fiberglass reaching pole available and accessible.

Since the Building Department performs inspections as pools are being built, we have a heightened concern with all aspects of pool safety. Please swim safe this summer!

Mail Theft, Fraud and Scams

No matter what the season or where you live thieves are always on the lookout for an opportunity to take advantage of someone else's hard work and resources. Unfortunately that means that the rest of us end up

having to take extra steps to protect our property and even our own identity. Being able to order a product online and having it delivered right to your doorstep is a great convenience that many of us take advantage of. Thieves can also take advantage of the fact that many of those packages sit in plain view for hours before the rightful owner can retrieve them. The mail box can also be a target as it may not only contain packages with merchandise, checks, credit cards or money but the mail we send and receive every day often contains personal identifying information which combined with the use of some of today's technology may be used to open fraudulent accounts or otherwise use your identity for illegal purposes.

To help prevent mail and package theft, retrieve the items as soon as possible after delivery. If possible have items delivered to your workplace or to a trusted neighbor where you know someone will be available to accept the package for you. For items you are expecting to be delivered, most delivery services make a tracking number available to you so you can know where your package is along its route and when to expect the delivery; you can even set up text or email notifications through many of the services to notify you when your package has arrived. Take any of your outgoing mail, especially with sensitive information, to a post office rather than leaving it in your mail box for pickup. Visible security cameras can deter thieves and help provide evidence if something does happen to get stolen. Investing in a locking mail box or renting a Post Office box may also fit your needs.

In addition to the technology we have available for good purposes, it is also being exploited by scammers and fraudsters who contact you by phone, email, text or other means who will try to separate you from your money or property; they somehow seem to know you by name and often have very convincing stories which may sound like an emergency situation where one of your own friends or relatives, who they also happen to know by name, is in need of some immediate cash to solve their problem. Or it may be that you get a call or email from what appears to be a well-known government agency or public utility threatening to have you arrested unless you pay the purported fee or past due bills. The caller ID on your phone may even look like the call is coming from a known agency but again with technology, there are ways to make things appear to be something they are not! These people will usually request that you send the money immediately by wire, a green dot card or similar prepaid card which is nearly impossible to trace. There are many more such schemes, too many to list here. Being pressured to act immediately is a sure sign of a scam. Just hang up the phone, delete the email or ignore the text. Do not provide or verify your personal information to the caller. Do not wire money or send money using a reloadable card. If you think it is at all possible the call is legitimate, VERIFY the information through independent routes such as calling your relatives, call the agency or business using a number you know belongs to that agency or business. Those numbers are available through the phone book or on legitimate bills you have received in the past.

Buying and selling of property over the Internet is fairly simple now days but as usual there are always people who will try to get something for nothing. One common scam involves a potential buyer offering to buy the item you have placed in an ad for sale, the supposed buyer sends you a check or money order for an amount well over what you had asked for. The buyer then asks you, for some roundabout reason, to send back the difference by wire or by a money card. The problem is that the check the buyer sent to you eventually bounces but the money you sent back was your own, real, hard earned money that you will never see again.
