Standing Relationship with SLVLESA

Herriman City receives its police services through the Unified Police Department ("UPD"). Residents who have lived in Herriman for years may remember a public safety fee on their water bill to fund the police services. That fee was changed to a tax in 2012 when the Herriman City Council at the time chose to join the Salt Lake Valley Law Enforcement Service Area ("SLVLESA"). SLVLESA became the taxing authority and exists solely to provide funding for certain municipalities, including Herriman, to the UPD. One elected official from Herriman serves on the SLVLESA governing board, along with representatives from other jurisdictions. We also have one seat at the UPD Board to oversee law enforcement operations. (See <http://slco.org/slvlesa/> for more information.)

Over the past few years Herriman has experienced remarkable population growth. Along with that growth, additional tax dollars have been collected for law enforcement services. At times, the city administration and elected officials have been concerned with whether police officer allocations have kept up with the population growth.

Elected officials from neighboring Riverton City have had similar growth concerns and have initiated the process of separation from SLVLESA, though they intend to remain with UPD. They learned state code would have required a vote of the residents to change their taxing authority. This legislative session, Representative Dan McCay sponsored House Bill 229, which created multiple paths for a municipality to separate from SLVLESA, including the option for a city council to make the decision to separate without a vote of the people if certain conditions are met.

Why does this matter to Herriman? Your city elected officials regularly evaluate the relationships we have with entities that provide municipal services to Herriman City. We are in the initial exploratory steps to determine if it would be in Herriman taxpayers' best interests to separate from SLVLESA, the taxing district. If the choice is made to separate from SLVLESA, police protection would still be provided by UPD through a contract negotiated directly with UPD. Steps to this separation process may include negotiations with SLVLESA administration and board members, a feasibility study, and public hearings for Herriman residents to express their opinion on the potential separation. A vote of the taxpayers is still an option under the revised state code.

The primary benefit of leaving SLVLESA would be the ability to directly negotiate a contract through UPD which would provide the city with direct control of collected tax revenue. The city could therefore have more influence over increasing new officer allocations when growth occurs. Herriman elected officials would be directly responsible for setting the tax rate. This direct oversight would provide more control over the timing of any tax increases, recognizing inflation and the cost of officer benefits and retirement programs are likely to rise each year. Depending on how the tax collection method would be structured, that inflation could be offset with other revenue sources such as sales tax revenue. However, we recognize other city revenue sources are lean and are already encumbered with other governmental service demands.

Stormwater pollution is the sediment, bacteria, fertilizers, pesticides, automotive fluids, and other materials that are washed from surfaces such as parking lots, roads, roofs, and construction sites during a rain storm or snow melt. The gutters, storm drains, pipes, ditches, and outfalls that comprise the stormwater system transport these pollutants to the nearest waterway. In our drainage, stormwater runoff is not treated at a wastewater treatment plant.

We have a better environment when we all are informed and aware of how we can make it better.

Pollutants in Urban Runoff:

1. Sediment
2. Nutrients
3. Bacteria
4. Oxygen demanding substances
5. Pathogens

Solutions to Pollutions:

1. Never dump anything into a storm drain (keep grass clippings and leaves out of the gutter)
2. Use fertilizers only when needed
3. Reduce the use of pesticides
4. Wash your car at the car wash instead of in your driveway
5. Clean up pet waste and dispose of it in the trash



9000 South to I-15



Bangarter Highway Improvement

UDOT will be returning to complete maintenance on the concrete pavement of the Bangarter Highway from 9000 South to the I-15 interchange. The project began last summer with the purpose of restoring the concrete pavement to a smoother and safer surface.

This project is expected to resume in mid-April and is scheduled to last 30 days. Work will usually take place during nighttime hours, from 7:00 pm to 5:00 am.

Work will include sealing the joints between the concrete sections and striping the roadway. Further nighttime concrete grinding is possible, but is not expected as the project nears completion.

Please obey all traffic signals and drive slowly when going through the project for your safety and that of the construction crews.



Herriman City is preparing to enter into their budget season. The departments have been busy preparing their individual budgets based on the City goals put in place by the City Council during the winter retreat that was held in January. These goals reflect the vision and mission statement of Herriman City. City Council placed their focus on community engagement, economic development, the general plan of the city, prioritizing capital projects, and maintaining a high level of service while remaining fiscally responsible. Herriman continues to cultivate a balanced lifestyle for our community through job creation, housing options, local amenities and recreational spaces --- synthesizing convenient living with a higher quality of life.





HOW DO WE FUND OUR BUDGET?



SALES, SERVICE & PROPERTY TAX

The two largest sources of revenue for the City are taxes and permits. Although our largest revenues are taxes very little of our revenue comes from property taxes. Our largest tax is Sales Tax which was just over \$4 million dollars last year. Franchise Tax which is the taxes derived from utilities such as electricity, gas, phones and TV and amounted to \$2.2 million dollars this in the past fiscal year. Property taxes are actually our smallest tax revenue at about half a million dollars per year. Herriman City receives 2.3% of the property taxes paid by residents of the City.




Licenses and Permits are the second largest revenue category mostly consisting of developer fees, these fees are expected to be \$7.5 million this year.

EXPENSES

OUR MAJOR EXPENDITURE CATEGORIES INCLUDE:

- General Government has City Council & Planning Commission
- Administration includes City Manager, Communications, Courts, Human Resources, City Recorder and Customer Service
- Finance includes Accounting & Information Technology
- Operations includes Fleet and Facilities, Streets, Snow Removal, Storm Drains and Street Lights and Signs
- Parks Recreation and Events includes our City events, Arts Council, Cemetery and Parks.
- Engineering includes City Engineer and GIS
- Community Development is our building department, planning and zoning and economic dev.



CAPITAL PROJECTS

Capital projects are things like roads, parks and storm drains. There have been a great deal of these types of expenditures in the last several years and there is always pressure to add additional infrastructure. The City is constantly involved in planning for these improvements.

Every three or four years we engage consultants to evaluate our current systems for capacity and expected needs. These consultants prepare a capital facilities plan for each of our major infrastructure needs.

We also develop an Impact Fee Analysis and assess impact fee on new development so that existing residents do not bear the burden for the cost associated with new development.

The Capital Facilities plan will also identify deficiencies in our infrastructure that is not related to growth and those things need to be funded with excesses in our General Fund.

GENERAL FUND

The general fund is our operating fund for the City. All services are funded from the general fund except for our Water Utility. All of our taxes and fees are included in the general fund and are used to pay the operations such as Administration, Finance, Operations – including road



maintenance, Parks & Recreation, Engineering and Community Development.

AA- DEBT SERVICE & BOND RATING

Herriman City has presented our financials to Standards and Poor rating service on two occasions. These ratings are used to determine our credit worthiness. The City primarily sells bonds to raise capital and bond rating is essential to getting favorable rates. In both evaluations Herriman City was rated AA-. This is a very high rating and has allowed us to obtain financing at rates far superior to the market. Herriman City has avoided using General Obligation bonds which attach to resident's property through property tax assessments and instead have focused on revenue bonds. Revenue bonds are secured by a revenue of the City, such as Sales Tax or water bills.

Don't Dirty Your Water

Backflow is the undesirable flow reversal of water or any other liquids into the distribution pipes of the potable water supply.

To protect the public potable water supply of any possible contamination, random inspections to ensure proper protection may be conducted.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

For ALL customers with underground sprinkling systems. Plumbing code requires a backflow preventer on all underground sprinkling systems. The backflow preventer is a device that prevents impurities or contaminants from being drawn into the water system. Many sprinkling systems already have the proper backflow preventer installed and need only to be tested annually. Others may not meet the state and local regulations and may need to be replaced with the proper backflow assembly.

In any case, a state certified backflow technician can determine whether or not your equipment meets the requirements. (You can find a list of technicians on our website at <https://www.herriman.org/city-departments/water/>.) The regulations also require a state certified backflow technician to test the backflow assembly annually. If the test discloses that the assembly is not operating satisfactorily, you must have the necessary repairs made and the assembly re-tested. On completion of the test showing the assembly is operating satisfactorily, the tester must then send a copy of the test report to The Herriman City Water Department.

We ask all residents to keep this in mind and to have their cans ready for collection in time, and to also ensure they are taken off the street in time for the health and safety of our neighborhoods.

Help Your Pet Find Their Way Home

Who: Pet licensing is required in ALL of Salt Lake County. A rabies tag or ID tag is not a valid pet license.

Why: Licensing allows your pet to be easily identified and returned to you. Most importantly, it's the LAW.

What: A license is a form of identification that makes your pet a legal member of the community. This also informs Animal Control Officers your pet has a current rabies vaccine.

When: Pets must be licensed within 30 days of getting your new pet, moving to a new area, or before he/she has reached 5 months of age.

Does your pet need to be licensed? If so, your pet can get a free vaccination and microchip at Salt Lake County Animal Services during business hours, Monday through Saturday, 10AM - 6PM. Listed below are the fees to license your animal in Herriman through Salt Lake County.

Public Lands

This year the Utah Legislature is working on a number of bills that would allow us to better care for our public lands and permit greater recreational access on lands controlled by the federal government. These include:

- HB 63, Hole in the Rock State Park, which creates a state park in the Hole in the Rock area.
- HB 95, Little Sahara State Park Designation, which creates a state park in the Little Sahara Recreation Area.
- HB 317, Antelope Island State Park Funding Amendments, which creates the Antelope Island State Park Improvement restricted account and sets up a way to fund it.
- HB 385, State Monuments Act, which establishes a process for the state to designate its own state monuments and creates rules for the management of them.
- HB 407, Utah Public Land Management Act Amendments, which declares that the state should retain lands in state ownership "for the enjoyment and betterment of the public and state" and requires super-majority support of two-thirds of the Legislature for public land sales.
- HCR 1, Concurrent Resolution to Secure the Perpetual Health and Vitality of Utah's Public Lands and its Status as a Premier Public Lands State, in order to reiterate that Utah is a premier public lands state and is committed to remaining a public lands state. It asserts that local control of Utah's public lands would result in greater opportunities for outdoor recreation, as well as economic opportunities for rural Utah.
- HCR 11, Concurrent Resolution Urging the President to Rescind the Bears Ears National Monument Designation, so as to not place greater restrictions on use of the land and make it nearly impossible for recreationalists to use much of it as they do now.
- HCR 12, Concurrent Resolution Urging Federal Legislation to Reduce or Modify the Boundaries of the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument, in order to allow greater use on and around those lands for locals and recreationalists.
- HCR 23, Concurrent Resolution Promoting Continued Access and Recreation on Lands Managed by the Bureau of Land Management, which supports expanding state and local control over access and recreation on BLM lands in order to ensure no loss of access.
- HCR 24, Concurrent Resolution on Native American Recreation and Public Purposes Grant, encourages the state of Utah to seek acquisition of the Bears Ears National Monument and supports a governance and management plan that includes southwestern Native American tribes.

Possible repercussions of leaving SLVLESA would include the loss of a large service district to absorb potential economic fluctuations. As a larger taxing district, SLVLESA can more easily bond and provide facility construction and other capital expenses whereas the city would have to carry this debt burden if we were to separate from SLVLESA. Without SLVLESA as a taxing entity, money collected for law enforcement services could be mingled with the city's general fund instead of being preserved in a dedicated fund. Having sole control of the funding, elected officials could be pressured to prioritize other city operational needs over providing law enforcement services. Alternatively, the council could explore options to set up a special fund or local district to ensure funds remain separate from other city accounts.

It is our desire as your elected officials to listen to your viewpoints regarding a potential withdrawal from the SLVLESA taxing district. We will continue to thoroughly study the issue and share information with you as the process evolves.
